## Lesson 1.1 — Self-Evident Truths — The Founding and Its Promise

### FLUENCY

1. Put in chronological order: (a) the Bill of Rights is ratified; (b) the Declaration of Independence; (c) the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia; (d) the Articles of Confederation take effect.

2. In the sentence 'they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights,' what does *unalienable* mean, and why does it matter that the rights come from a Creator rather than a government?

3. Define the Three-Fifths Compromise in one sentence and name the document it appears in.

### APPLICATION

4. Source this excerpt: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men and women are created equal.' Who wrote it, when, for what audience, and why does it copy the Declaration?

5. Douglass asked, 'What, to the American slave, is your 4th of July?' in Rochester on 5 July 1852. How does the date and his audience affect how reliable the speech is as evidence, and of what?

6. Several states ratified the Constitution in 1787-1788, and the Bill of Rights was added in 1791. Did ratification cause the Bill of Rights, or did it only come before it? Explain.

7. Prerequisite review: name the thinker whose idea that governments rest on the consent of the governed appears in the Declaration, and the thinker associated with separating legislative, executive and judicial power.

## **Lesson 1.2 — Federal Power, State Power and a Widening Democracy, 1787-1900**

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### FLUENCY

1. Order these events: Compromise of 1877; McCulloch v. Maryland; Fifteenth Amendment; South Carolina's nullification crisis; Mississippi's 1890 constitution.

2. Use 'nullification' correctly in a sentence about 1832.

### APPLICATION

3. Read: 'No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States.' Identify the document, its date, and what is structurally new about the words 'No State.'

4. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address dates the nation from 1776 ('Four score and seven years ago'). Why might a historian treat that choice as evidence, and of what?

5. Reconstruction ended in 1877, and Plessy v. Ferguson was decided in 1896. A student writes: 'The end of Reconstruction caused Plessy.' Evaluate the claim.

## Lesson 1.3 — Seminar — Faith, Reform and Religious Liberty

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### FLUENCY

3. Source Washington's words: 'the Government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance.' Who was he writing to, when, and why does the audience matter?

4. Jefferson's phrase 'a wall of separation between Church & State' comes from a private letter to Baptists in 1802. How reliable is it as evidence of what the First Amendment means?

5. The Second Great Awakening came before the rise of abolitionism in the 1830s. Did the revival cause abolitionism, or only precede it?

5. Washington's Atlanta address (1895) came one year before Plessy v. Ferguson (1896). Did the speech cause the decision?
