Lesson 1.1 — Making Peace in 1919 — Versailles, the Fourteen Points and the League

5. Cause or sequence? “Germany suffered hyperinflation in 1923; the Great Depression began in 1929.” Did one cause the other? What links the postwar economy to the Depression?
